## Index to The *Texas Postal History Society Journal*

### Introduction

This *Index* is arranged alphabetically in two parts: by subject, and by author. Those articles, notes, photographs, etc., without a by-line are listed under the then-current editor. Some few typographical errors in names and places have been corrected. All references to town and county names, maps, postmarks, post offices, etc., **pertain to Texas**, unless otherwise noted.

### The Journal

The Texas Postal History Society was founded in 1975 with the first issue of its journal appearing in December of that year. The publication is quarterly, with four issues per volume. The first 29 volumes of the journal is typed and photocopied, is of 8½x 11” format, and is stapled in the upper left corner, except for the Texas Sesquicentennial issue (Volume 11, No. 1, March 1988), which is bound. Starting with volume 30, the Journal is printed in color in magazine format.

Notes:

1. Beginning with Vol. 5, No. 4 (Dec. 1980), the feature “Texas Gems” uses page numbers (of the feature only) on the bottom of the pages, with the regular journal pages on the top of the page. To avoid confusion, the journal page numbers are used here.
